

PRIZE MONEY AT SCCA RUNOFFS P+A SPECIAL VEHICLES

ENGLEWOOD CLIFFS, NJ-Porsche drivers entered
in this year's Road
Atlanta Sports Car Club
of America National Championship Runoffs can earn
as much as \$18,000 in
contingency money posted
by the Porsche Audi
Division of Volkswagen
of America.

According to the announcement made here by Josef Hoppen, Manager of Special Vehicles for Porsche Audi, \$6,000 has been posted in each of three National Championship divisions - C-Production, D-Production and Showroom Stock A.

A Porsche driver winning any one of the three classifications will earn \$3,000 while second place will be worth \$2,000 and third \$1,000.

Porsche fans can look forward to the SCCA C-Production competition debut of the 944 when the annual SCCA finale gets underway October 22 at the North Georgia track. Reigning D-Production National Champion Tom Brennan is

expected to test the prototype C-Production 944 there. For the last two years, Porsches have been top contenders in D-Production and Showroom Stock A and have won back-to-back national championships in D-Production.

Not since Milt Minter piloted a 911 to victory in 1961, however, has a Porsche won C-Production class. Leading the C-Production contingent along with Brennan will be David Finch of Ann Arbor, MI. Finch will compete in his rapid Brumos Atlanta 914-6.

According to Hoppen, developing a 944 C-Production racer is the latest step in Porsche's SCCA program which, in the past, concentrated on the D-Production class. Again, however, this year D-Production could be a contest between Porsche teams as Brennan. the reigning titlist. steps into his Herman+ Miller Porsche Audi dealer team entry to defend his crown. Among his challengers is expected to be

Herman+Miller teammate, Cincinnati's John O'Steen, who posted a perfect six-for-six regular season record with his D-Production Porsche.

Other strong contenders are expected to include SCCA Northeast Division D-Production champ Steve Pieper of Alexandria, VA in his Heishman Porsche Audi entry and Bob Nikel's racer entered by Sewickley Porsche Audi.

From the West and Midwest. two Porsche Audi dealerbacked entries and an independently sponsored Porsche are looking for a D-Production crown. Bruce Frenzel of Chesterfield, MO will drive his Passport Transport, Inc./ George Follmer entry, while Bob Kirby of Los Angeles will pilot his Vasek Polak Porsche Audi racer, Finally, Stefan Edlis of Minneapolis will drive his Apollo Plastics entry in Atlanta, Hoping to share the Porsche Audi prize fund.

In Showroom Stock A, Don Istook of Fort Worth, TX is one of the favorites to repeat Porsche's 1980 SSC Road Atlanta triumph.

In addition to providing contingency awards, Porsche Audi makes Road Atlanta available on an exclusive basis for Porshe team practice and testing. This year's Porsche test day will occur on October 14.

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




The event was followed by a delicious brat lunch plus an entourage of many more goodies -- super eating!
