

FASTOADS AND OTHER WEIRD PHENOMENON

Have you ever noticed that certain cars resemble animals or fish? It is my belief that the 911 Porsche has certain characteristics, styling wise, of a big frog or a giant toad.



If you look at the car carefully, you will start to notice an amazing number of frog characteristics. For example, the headlights protrude much like a frog eyed Sprite. 
Wayne's trophy room. If you feel brave, ask him to see it sometime. You might mistake it for a model 911.

The biggest news this month is concerning the fantastic performance by the McLaren TAG-Porsche powered Formula One machines driven by Alain Prost and Keke Roseberg. One can only guess what the other teams must be thinking—here is the same 'old' car as last year, out there winning races. They for the most part, have introduced their 'best' for the season. Whatever will they do when McLaren brings out their new car later in the season.

On April 27, the Formula One teams met at Imola, Italy for the San Marino Grand Prix. As we painfully remember last year's race, where Alain Prost won, and then was disqualified for being under weight, this year he stopped the car just feet from crossing the finish line, so as not to repeat. Event though 4 of the top 10 finishers ran out of fuel. Prost won a clean race. Team mate Keke did run out of fuel, but was credited with fifth place over all. As an aside, Prost also won in 1984, just think, if the car had weighed just a few kilos more last year. he would have had a hat-trick!

So, on to Monaco, the best known and most prestigious race of the Formula One Series. On May 11, Alain earned his hattrick by winning his third consecutive Monaco Grand Prix. As quoted by Autoweek, 'His usual umimpressive self', Prost drove a clean and trouble free race. Fuel economy was not a serious issue in Monte Carlo, but only three cars finished on the same lap.



The Formula One race is one-fourth completed, four of sixteen races have been run. Alain Prost is in first place in point standings, and teammate Keke Rosberg is in fourth place. Prost is now very close to the record for all time career wins in Formula One with a total of 23. Fangio won 24, Clark won 25, and Jackie Stewart won 27.

And just think, all that engine technology will find it's way into the street
Porsches of the future!!!!!





NORD STERN TESTS THE LATEST RADARS & RADAR DETECTORS



The story that you are about to read is true, the names have been changed to protect the guilty. Once upon a time on a cold winter morning in a county far, far away, three brave(?) men journeyed to seek the truth about radar detectors and radar guns.

What they found was good news and bad news. First, the good news: the radar detectors are better than ever. The bad news: so are the radar guns.


In order to put everything in perspective, we must meet the contestants. First, the bad guys. In the corner to my right having power output of only 12 milowats, occupying 24.150 GHz on the wave band, and possessing instant "on" button, the nasty Kustom Electronics KR 10 SP 'K' band. It's tag team partner is of equally low power output of only 10 milowats and comes to you over 10.525 GHz on the dial, the

M.P.H. K55'X'band. And now, the good guys (ranging in price from \$100 to \$330); Escort, Passport, Cobra Trapshooter 300, Bel Microeye remote, Whistler Spectrum 2, Arrow 38(Autotronics Inc.), and Snooper 6000. Since most everyone reading this knows about radar dectectors, I will not go into detail on their operation and construction. Suffice to say that each is of superheterdyne circuitry.




Our testing procedure was very similar to a normal road situation where one may encounter a patrol car parked over a hill. Several passes were made with each detector and the distance from the gun noted. The distance shows initial alert and non uninterrupted signal. Please understand that the range of the detectors in this test is only for this specific location and radar position. Under different road and weather conditions (humidity, rain snow) the distance may be decreased or increased. Another interesting item discovered by accident was that by using a plexiglass (absence of lead in the glass) rear window in my car, we could increase the didtance by another 15 to 20%.

As you can see from the two charts, the difference in performance is signaficant, especially when one considers the advertising claims made by the manufacturers In general, two surprises have come up: the Snooper 6000 performed very well in our test, and the new Whistler Spectrum 2 performed very poorly. The Snooper looks to be very good buy at \$240, while the Spectrum at \$330 looks to be a very overpriced for the performance unit. The Spectrum false alarmed repeatedly on the road and even when I used by garage door opener (sad, but true.). We also acted on a hot tip that the Escort



has improved recently. We borrowed a new unit with a serial number of 1100000 and put it to the test with its' older brother numbering 600000. The new kid beat the older in 'K' band slightly, and significantly in the 'X' band. A call to the folks at Cincinnati Microwave confirmed the additional tinkering with the Escort in recent months. I was informed of an improvement to the I.F. 6






In conclusion, I would like to make a few comments about radar. For one, radar equipment presently is very sophisticated and accurate (no more "in car" tuning) and only tuning fork verification of correct speed readout is necessary. When in moving mode, the only way to use the radar is to read the speed on on-coming traffic, and not be following it, unless of course it's the Hawk by Kustom Electronics (you can always ask the nice patrolman which

radar he/she is using). Also, the angle of the radar to the car is very important. To illustrate this point, picture a patrol car on the shoulder of the road with the gun pointed straight forward. You are approaching from the opposite direction with the highway median between you and the gun. The speed will actually read less then the speed you are travelling. And now for the real bad newsvirtually all radar units can now be purchased with the "BUTTON". Stay tuned for future radar detector updates. My thanks to Mike Doperalski and Dave Weber for their assistance.





You've heard the stories. you've seen the flyers, and now you get your chance. Just north of Grand Rpaids we have one of the most challenging road couses in the midwest. Grattan Raceway is unique with many different types of turns. elevation changes and a very fast half mile straight. This event will be based on past Grattan events. It will be sanctioned by the Porsche Club, but open to cars other than Porsches. Early pre-registration is advisable to guarantee your entry. Inorder to provide save, usable track time for different types of cars and drivers, we will again be running spearate run groups. Group A - novice, Groups B and C intermediate, and Group D advanced.

Driving instructors will be mandatory for all Grattanfirst time drivers. We will work with you until we feel you are comfortable. Anyone asking for additional instruction will not be refused. The event starts with Tech at 8:00 AM. Tech will close at 10:30 AM. Helmets must be Snell 1975 approved or newer and will be checked and marked at Tech.

The first run group starts at 9:05 AM with the track closing no later than 6:00 PM, but as early as 5:00 PM.



Run groups will run 25 minute each within 50 minute sessions. The track will close for 10 minutes on the hour to allow traffic to crossin and out of the paddock area, and to change corner workers.

Mandatory driver's meeting will be at 8:30 AM, and at 11:50 AM. You must attend one before being allowed on the track.

The continued success of this type of event depends greatly upon driver cooperation. This event will be run on time and safely.








Brian Redman's Cat

This story was given to me by Bob Shedd, WMR member. Passed from corner worker to corner worker, this tale touches the heart of corner workers everywhere, anyone who has driven Road America, and anyone who has ever loved a cat. Editor.

There are a lot of different versions about why people everywhere are drinking to Brian Redman's Cat. Credit for the cat has been claimed by various groups. Drivers, crew members, every race worker specialty and even some of the more alcoholic spectator groups. Everyone want's to get into the act. Don't believe any of them. I'll give you the tru facts. Ignore all rumors. Especially the one that says the cat was invented by corner workers at an emergency drinking meeting of the "Road Racing Roundtable" in the parking lot of Schwarz's at St. Anna, Wisconsin.

Corner workers are danned particular who they raise a glass to. Their toasts are a sign of respect bestowed only on the fastest. People




like Fanzio, Moss, Clark, Donahue, and Brian Redman. (No. 1 with most corner workers). All properly conducted Saturday evening drinking contests follow a pattern. You take turns proposing a toast. You are expected to toast someone faster than your predecessor. Lately the toasting seems to always end with a final toast. "Here's to Brian Redman's Cat". That cat really isn't quicker than Brian, but he's faster than most, especially in the rain (his claws are an advantage). Here's the straight story.

"The Cat", he didn't have a name in those days, (actually he still doesn't), was first noticed by corner workers at Road America near Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin. He lived his entire first





life right there at the track. That first life is what started the legend. I'm certain that each of his remaining lives will contribute to the legend and he will take his rightfull place in racing history.




When first spotted he certainly didn't look like legend material. He was apparently booted out of a car as a kitten and grew up wild at Road America, scrounging for his food and fighting for survival. He was a skinny pitiful sight, obviously undernourished and very anti-social. The event was a cold May drivers school and it was raining. But the dumb cat was standing there, soaked to his skin, watching the race cars just like the corner workers. He was obviously impressed.

"The Cat" was having a really rough time when he discovered the generousity of the corner workers. At lunch time eating with them was better than scrounging for food. This was easy, he was well fed on any corner he visited. He never tumbled to the fact that maybe the amount of food available for cats had something to

do with the quality of the lunches. He learned to really love the vulcanized bratwurst with a melted Hershey bar on top. He even learned to like "mystery meat". Eventually he became more tame and actually permitted a few corner workers to give him an occasional pat on the head. He seemed to enjoy them and their company.

Later he started drinking with the workers at the end of the day. He found that most corner workers had alco-




holic beverages in their survival kits for after the last car. He got into the habit of making the rounds of the corners. He'd have a quick one with anybody that was willing to share.



When he wasn't eating or drinking he was watching the race cars. He couldn't hide his admiration for the faster drivers because he was pretty fast himself. Just like his friends, the workers, he became an ardent fan of Brian Redman. In fact. everytime Brian Redman raced at Road America you could find "The Cat" hanging around his pit. If you looked real careful you could see he was listening and watching Brian's every move. As years went by "The Cat" developed two burning ambitions. One was to drink with every corner worker in the country and the other was to beat Brian Redman's time on Road America. He used to work at it at night. If you were at the right place at the right time you could see that cat,

which by then was known as "Brian Redman's Cat", doing hot laps. Gradually he worked his time down to where he was within a couple seconds of Brian Redman's best time. He probably might have made it if it hadn't been for an unfortunate accident. One particularly dark night he had a real fast lap going. He came into Station 10 right on the ragged edge. A large deer was asleep on the apex and he hit it at speed. There weren't any corner workers there to help and he did not survive the crash.

The next morning when the corner workers came out to set up the station at 10, they found his remains, and out of respect for the cat and Brian Redman, they buried him with a good view of the turn.





Today at Station 10 you'll find a rather large mound of rocks with a crude cross on top of it. That's the final resting place of Brian Redman's Cat. When a corner worker is assigned to Station 10, it is traditional to add one more rock to the pile.

That might have been the end of this legend except for a strange phenomenon that was noticed shortly after the crash. Whenever corner

workers got together for serious drinking, THe Cat would usually show up after a sufficient number of tasts "To Brian Redman's Cat". That dammed Cat would come back for one more drink with his friends, the corner workers. And so is you're a good corner worker and have faith, and especially if you drink enough, (this is very important) sooner or later, you will see Brian Redman's Cat.







So You Want The Day Off...

There never seems to be enough time for us to do what we love to do best in the spring and summer days — drive our Porsches. So, it's Thursday, and you've already put in a good week. Your desk is reasonably clear, so you decide to go talk to your supervisor. The sun is shining, and what a great day for a drive, maybe to the lake for a picnic — taking the long way of course!! Why not??

You knock on the door of your supervisor's office, and invite yourself in, ask about the weather (you already know it's fantastic), ask about the family (also doing well), and then after shuffling your feet for a minute or so, you pop the question and ask for the day off. Your answer? Maybe something like this.....

So, you want the day off... Let's take a look at what you are asking for... There are 365 days per year available for work. There are 52 weeks per year in which you already have two days off per week, leavin 261 days available for work. Since you spend 16 hours of each day away from work. you have used up 170 days. Leavin only 91 days available. You spend 30 minutes each day on coffee break that accounts for 23 days each year, leaving only 68 days available. 


