



I have volunteered to do the first two issues of our newsletter. This issue will be lacking in solidarity and unity because of the time limitations; plan-

HEATER AND DEFROSTING SYSTEM

From the Rocky Mountain Region's Porsche Patter and their for-

mer tech editor, Vern Racek (Rod Bender):
"Now, as to the heater and defrosting system.

This whole system is adequate providing two rules are complied with: 1. Get the heater cables and rods all adjusted properly and working freely, lubricate lightly. 2. You will not be warm or defrosted if you do not use the car properly. We all drive in town much too much. This is a road car. It will not deliver a million BTU's in town for several reasons: A. There is not enough load on the engine to get the oil to operation temperature (at least 1800). Driving in 3rd or 4th gear in town, does not turn the fan fast enough to really push the hot air through the heater ducts. Also, these bodies are fairly tight and unless one or both of the rear windows, (Or side windows) are open, the hot air cannot circulate out of the heater ducts. If a Porsche (With the heater properly adjusted) is driven on the road at the legal limit (Or above) you will get all the heating and defrosting you can use and you will have to turn the darned thing back unless you are in a blizzard or 300 below.

HEATER AND DEFROSTING SYSTEM CONT.

It boils down to these facts:

1. Keep the heater adjusted properly.

2. The amount of heat is dependent upon how

high you get the oil temp.


3. When the engine is warm, the volume of hot air delivered is directly proportional to the speed of the cooling fan. Use a lower gear than normal in town driving.

4. Open both rear windows (or side windows)

to get circulation.

5. If you drive mostly in town and are still not comfortable, investigate installation of a gas heater.

Personally I feel the heater is adequate considering now simple and trouble free it is to maintain and operate. And on top of that it does not cost extra when you buy the car.

7. Committee membership - # points for chairman, # points for member, and # points for committee attendance.


8. Seat belts - ## points for two sets installed in your
