IROC I and II were successfully hosted by Motor-Stadt in June and Michiana region in July in East Lansing and South Bend, respectively. WMR's event was scheduled for September 29, a little late in the season due to the availability of US-131 Motorsports Park in Martin, our home course.

When the always-dependable IROC team showed up early that Sunday morning to set up they were unfortunately met with the a few more motorhomes and event participants on the course than normally anticipated after a big weekend.



Because of this the team was unable to set up the course to start the event on time, so the event was canceled primarily for safety reasons despite the rain that moved in.

Not wanting to give up our event on our anniversary year, we rescheduled for Sunday, October 27. The team joked, "We always run, even in the rain." We changed that to, "We always run, even in the snow." Everyone was ready to take another crack at it, even though the weather could be dicey. and due to an unfortunate set of circumstances beyond our control at the facility the event was canceled and Western Michigan Region was unable to celebrate our 45th annual IROC autocross season.

A long wooded drive ended up at one of the most spectatcular locations for a car collection



THE 1930'S SHELL GAS STATION AT THE GILMORE CAR MUSEUM

CHAPTER 3: HISTORY IS MADE

(Continued from the October Über Alles)

Now things started to move at a dizzying speed. A local contractor was hired and earth began to move. Building material began arriving and mud was everywhere. It was amazing how quickly the station began to take shape. About that time we were contacted by a vendor who made commemorative paving bricks for fund-raising purposes. So we were now also in the brick business and had to find a volunteer to take charge of that part of the operation. In walked Jennine - a young mother of a toddler boy looking for such an assignment - we called her "the brick lady. She did a fantastic job recording requests, ordering bricks and making sure bricks were placed where donors wished. All the while Dick Walters would arrive with Shell artifacts. So many pieces in fact that we were running out of space to store them.


He appeared one day with three long porcelain signs advertising services such as "Lubrication", that I found would fit perfectly on the front and sides of the building. He stated that he had purchased them years before from a farmer only a mile down Hickory road who rescued them when the Shell gas station in Hickory Corners was being torn down. Later, he called saying he found a large shell in white porcelain that he thought could be added to the outside of the station. He sent the piece up to the museum and I had my staff place it in one of the arches at the roofline and called Dick back to say it fit as if we planned the station with the piece in mind. He then said he had two more, if I wanted them to which I replied, yes. It appeared that he was donating all of his collection to the museum so much, I began to become embarrassed and cautioned him to keep something for himself. He replied that he was getting on in years and couldn't take them with him and furthermore was planning a small museum in downtown Marshall. True to his word, the museum has been open for a number of years now and as where he promised.

Other general artifacts began arriving as well, an antique brass cash register, an old telephone, air pump, tire changing equipment, oil cans and a AAA sign that my brother Bob found in the local Door County, Wisconsin dump. Dick also sent up a truckload of gas pump illuminated glass globes of various gasoline brands. To say that the Museum's Gas station was now properly outfitted with the right amount of period gas station artifacts would be an understatement.

The construction of the 1930's Shell Gas Station brought the much needed attention of the public to revitalize the interest in the Gilmore Car Museum. To this day, the Museum is North America's largest auto museum with over 400 vehicles on display, over 190,000 square feet of exhibit space and more than 112,000 guests from all over the world.

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

What is in your car?

Engine oil, the fluid of life for your engine.

It's not all created equal and as time goes on, we must have a general idea of what we are buying for our cars.

Here is a breakdown of the specifications found on a container of Motul 8100 X-cess SAE5W40, our most common oil. A key component of engine oil is its viscosity. Viscosity is the ability of the oil to flow - the lower the number, the better the viscosity. This is very critical during cold weather start-ups.

- SAE Society of Automotive Engineers
- 5 This is the viscosity of the oil when it is cold
- W The oil is rated for use during the winter months
- 40 This is the viscosity of the oil during engine operation.

There is also what is known as "Absolute Viscosity". This is the measure of force required to move one layer of oil film over the other. The higher the number the more force or power is required.

All oil loses its viscosity with temperature, to some degree. Choosing the correct weight depends upon climate, driving conditions and application. But it's not just a matter of picking the correct weight oil, it's also insuring it has the necessary additives and is Porsche approved.

Factory ratings or approval tables must now be watched closely, since oils rated A40, C40, C30 or C20 can now be found. Oil ratings can be very confusing and even though a container of oil is labeled Motul or Mobil 1, we still need to make sure it's the correct oil.

The only Porsche testing procedure I could come up with was for A40 and I am sure oils with the ratings of C40 and C30 etc., go through similar or even greater testing.



Porsche A40 Testing Procedure - This test will last 203 hours. During that time the engine and oil will go through the following simulations:

- 4 periods simulating 35 hours of summer driving
- 4 periods simulating 13.5 hours of winter driving
- · 40 cold starts
- 5 periods simulating 1-hour sessions on the Nürburgring racetrack
- 3.5 hours of a running-in program

During the simulations, measurements on the engine and on the oil will be done at regular intervals and the following parameter will be taken into account to grant the approval or not.

- Torque curve (internal friction)
- · Oxidation of the oil
- · Piston cleanliness and ring sticking
- Valve train wear and protection
- Engine cleanliness and sludge; after 203 hours, no deposits must be visible
- Bearing wear protection; visual rating according to Porsche in-house method.

To the best of my knowledge, this is the most rigorous testing that any given oil had to pass to get the Porsche A40 rating approval.

I believe the A40 rating began in or around 1984. While there are many oils that have this rating, you will have to read the label because it can be "hidden" in among other manufacturer's ratings. (See adjoining Motul label)



So we've covered the A40 rating, let's take a moment to discuss the C40, C30 and C20 ratings that can be found on many oils.

The "C" stands for protection against LSPI or Low Speed Pre-Ignition and the protection of emission components such as the G.P.F (Gasoline Particulate Filters) in our direct injected engines. The G.P.F. helps clean up emissions and began appearing on our mid 2018 models. The 40, 30 and 20 represents the weight or viscosity of the oil.

Sound confusing? Finding the correct oil for your Porsche can be quite an ordeal, but Porsche has come up with a great solution.

Porsche Classic Oils! I love the Porsche Classic Oils because they are fool proof. Just find the can with the picture of your car on it and you've made the right choice. This is one purchase that you can't screw up. On the downside is it's \$15.00 per liter plus shipping price tag.

Here is a "Porsche Recommended Oil Chart" you can use as a guideline.

- 356, 912, 914, 911 up to 2.7 20W50 Porsche Classic (This is a high Zinc level petroleum-based oil)
- 911, 964, 993 10W60 Porsche Classic Low Zinc Full Synthetic Oil
- 924, 944, 968, 928 Porsche Classic 10W50 Synthetic
- 986, 996 Porsche Classic 5W50 Synthetic
- 987, 997, 987.2, 981, 991 Porsche A40 Synthetic

There are several other oil brands that meet the requirements for the above oils that are much less expensive, such as Motul Classic oils. When it comes to our cars that require the "C" rating (C40, C30, C20), Mobil 1 ESPX3 OW40 is about the only choice.

Choosing the least expensive or oil of the wrong specification rating is a sure-fire way to ruin your car's engine. Today's engines are manufactured with very fine tolerances and operate at higher temperatures and rpms than conventional engines. Purchasing the correct oil and changing it often can keep your engine running like new and trouble free for a longer time.

Well, the snow and cold air have arrived and I'm not sure I'm ready for it, but ready or not it's here. With the colder weather mice and other such creatures will be looking for a comfortable place to spend the winter.
